College Ministry: Pray, Encourage, Disciple

ollege Ministry is often one of the most formative aspects in the life of young people in the church. Students are learning what it means to be Godly men and women and how to honor God with their lives as they move towards adulthood. The most important aspect of any college ministry is not the college group itself, but a church that is intentional about ministering to its college students. While Jess and I, alongside Chris and Elizabeth Harrod, spend time every week teaching, discipling, and growing in relation with the college students, the role of ministering to students is the responsibility of the church as a whole. I want to outline three distinct ways the church can be engaged in ministering to college students.

Pray for our college students

College is a fun and exciting time, but also a very difficult time for many. A recent poll from Psychology Today noted that 73% of American college students report feeling lonely and isolated - higher than any other age bracket. Now as much as ever, we need to be praying and encouraging the students in our church. When Paul writes to Timothy, he tells him that he prays for him day and night – that he would be filled with joy and strengthened in his faith (2 Tim. 1:3-5). In this same manner, we should pray for our college students - that their faith would be strengthened and they would be filled with the joy of Jesus Christ.

Encourage our college students

When Paul writes the first letter to the Thessalonians, he expresses a great desire be united with the church. He describes this as being "being separated - in person, not in heart" (1 Thes. 2:17-18). In just a couple of months, many of the college students in our church will move away from here to attend

various colleges throughout the state and the country. And while we are separated from them for a time during the semester, we are united with them in heart and in spirit. How encouraging it would be for these students to receive letters and care packages reminding them that their home church loves them text messages letting them know that we are praying for them - phone calls to pray alongside them.

Hebrews 3:13 tells us to "encourage one another every day, as long as it is called "today," that none of you may be hardened by the deceitfulness of sin." College is a season of new excitement, growth, and transition but also a season of new temptation, trials, and weariness. When the church encourages its college students, we help point them to Christ and resist the deceitfulness of sin that the world offers them.

Disciple our college students

The responsibility of discipleship does not fall solely on an individual, a leader, a pastor, or some ministry position in the church. Discipleship is the responsibility of the church. Life-on-life discipleship is central to building up college students into Godly men and women. I speak personally when I say that my life was shaped by mature Godly men who invested in my life while I was in college. Look for opportunities to engage with students, invite them to join your Sunday school class, or take them to lunch after church (it will probably be the nicest meal they eat all week).

A church that is engaged in discipling the college students is actively working to build up the next generation of leaders, and Godly men and women
