God Desires for Our Speech to Honor Him

ur words are more meaningful than we realize. Or if we do realize that, then our words are more consequential than we realize. Our words matter. Our speech matters. How we talk matters. And the way that we most clearly come to know this reality is that God tells us that it matters to Him. I want us to consider this very often overlooked but weighty truth - God desires for our speech to honor Him. Let us consider this statement from these three different angles - What We Say; What We Do Not Say; and How We Say What We Say:

What We Say

The actual words that proceed from our mouths are important. We must speak. And when we do speak, the words we say should have value and purpose and meaning with them. There is so much that can be said about the purpose of the words we speak. We cannot cover it all here. But here are a few thoughts.

Our words can instruct, clarify, build up, communicate. Plainly stated, our words are useful. Where would be without our ability to talk? Understanding the real usefulness, value, and purpose to our speech is found in God's instruction to us about our speech.

In Psalm 19:14 David says, "Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in your sight, O Lord." Jesus says, "what comes out of the mouth proceeds from the heart" (Matt. 15:18). And in another place (Jas 3:10) we hear, "From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers, these things ought not to be so." What we say matters, and it matters because God desires that our speech is to honor Him.

What We Do Not Say

Not only does What We Say matter, but What We Do Not Say matters too. We should be more hesitant to speak in certain ways. Lies, complaints, grumblings, boasts, gossip, slander, and profanity should all be avoided. We should be mindful of God's desire for our speech to honor him, and therefore we should be more readily "quick to hear and slow to speak" (James 1:19).

Proverbs 30:32 says "If you have been foolish, exalting yourself, or if you have been devising evil, put your hand on your mouth." In some cases, it is better and wiser to not speak. We need to learn that. We all need to grow in the area of What We Do Not Say. Ephesians 4:29 says, "Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouths, but only what is helpful for building others up according to their needs, that it may benefit those who listen". If it is not good for the occasion, then we must learn to not say it.

If God can be honored in what we say, then God can also be honored in us not saying things that dishonor Him. Learning this truth is a recognizable sign of growth and maturity.

How We Say What We Say

Finally, not only is What We Say and What We Do Not Say important, but also How We Say What We Say is important too. Learning this is also an attractive sign of growth and maturity. It is possible to say a good thing in a bad way or to say a bad thing in a good way.

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A Sending Church: Missionary Care Team

ith our church sending out one of our families to the mission field (and more on the way!), our church has a newly formed Missionary Care Team to help advocate for and support them. I want to take some time to briefly explain this team: the purpose, the goal, and the structure. I want to explain and provide these details, so you are aware that our church is taking seriously and joyously this responsibility of being a sending church.

The purpose of this team is to be an advocate for our missionaries, which involves intentional connection and care for those we have sent out. As many of you know, when we don't see people face to face, it can be easy for them to slip from our minds. It doesn't usually happen overnight, but over time we can start to think about them less and less. Our hope for this team is that this would never be true of our missionaries. We desire for them to be fresh on our hearts, constant in our prayers, and deeply encouraged by our church's support. While all of us as a church are responsible for these things, the Care Team will be intentional in ensuring these things happen, that we "send them on their journey in a manner worthy of God" (3 John 6).

The goal is that this team will cause our missionaries to still feel encouraged, supported by, and connected to our church. On the flip side, the goal is also that our church will feel connected with them, consistently praying for them, and helpful partners to them and their ministry.

The team is currently is made up of 8 individuals and is structured similarly to our committees. Members of the team are

expected to join on a 2 year minimum basis and have the option to rotate, so there will be opportunities for others to join this team in the future! You can expect that the team will provide updates on our missionaries frequently, as well as provide avenues for our church as a whole to practically love and encourage them. It is a really strong team, who have been an intentional source of encouragement and love to our three families we are sending. I am really excited about this team, and I have already seen some of the great benefit that it will be to come.
